Royal Cross Primary School is a values-based school because we believe in developing a set of skills and attitudes that prepare our children to take their place in the modern world.

Our children are guided by a set of school values that were chosen by parents, pupils, teachers and governors. These represent 6 core values that the whole school community chose to be central to the nurturing of our children.

The purpose of developing a values-based school is to provide a welcoming and positive ethos based on equality, fairness and mutual respect with each child's achievements celebrated.

These values will be the basis of all our values teaching because we want our pupils to be the best they can possibly be in all aspects of their life. We want them to have ambition and aspiration - to strive to make life better for themselves and for others throughout their primary school years and beyond.

Why do we have school values?

Values are aspirational attributes and attitudes. These can be nurtured to help pupils discover the very best of themselves, which enables them to be good citizens and prepares them for the life of work. It equips pupils with social skills that help them co-operate, communicate and relate to others effectively. It provides them with the self-esteem and confidence to explore and develop their full potential.

For example: -

"Are my actions respectful?" "Are my actions kind?"

They provide a guide and a moral compass for our pupil's actions and behaviour. In making choices about how to act and how to behave, pupils will become familiar with and guided by our agreed core values.

Our aim at Royal Cross is to ensure that all learning takes place in a supportive atmosphere that all our pupils can access and enjoy. They are also central to our behaviour policy, which can be found on the web site.

What about school rules?

Rather than have lists of school rules – we reinforce our aspirational values. Every member of our school community can strive towards a higher understanding of our core values through a careful combination of practice and instruction. Our pupils learn what values are, how to recognise them and how people react to them, equipping them with invaluable social communication skills and emotional intelligence.

How do we celebrate our school values?

Our school's core values are displayed prominently around the school and in each classroom.

Each day, we acknowledge children who show our values. Values slips given out to acknowledge the positive behaviour choices that pupil's make.

We also have Celebration Assemblies each week, when Values Star of the Week certificates are awarded to a child in each class and shared with families through the web site and School Dojo.
